## Legislative and Advocacy Update by Kevin Gadsey

The Alaska Legislature is in session and working on several bills directly affecting the disability community. So break out your computer or your pen, and your mind, to communicate to your elected officials your thoughts on these bills.

Disability Language Changes – House Bill 357/Senate Bill 242 – Rep. Wilson (R-Wrangell) sponsored a bill that is on the fast track in the House to change the old language written into the laws regarding disabilities, such as handicapped' and 'infirm,' to person-first language such as 'individuals with disabilities.' The changes may seem minor, but 19 western states have already implemented similar legislation. SAIL's team has partnered with the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation to help push the bill through the various committees on both sides and Ketchikan IL Specialist Kara Lunde was even heard on the radio discussing the issue.

Two proposed bills may pose problems for persons in the disability community. H.B. 303 seems to create limitations and more rules for persons on the Adult Companion Medicaid waiver. H.B 287 lessens the requirement for new nursing homes to get a "Certificate of Need" before building in certain areas. Currently, nursing homes must prove a need in a certain area before building.
