Assistive Technology (AT)

SAIL believes that people with disabilities have the right to control and direct their own choices, and the right to access the information they need in order to make informed decisions according to their goals and interests. AT is the cornerstone of this right and often makes it possible for individuals to gain employment and live independently.

Thanks to visionary grants from the Rasmuson Foundation, Alaska Mental Health Trust, Alaska Department of Health and Social Services. collaborative partnership with GCI. unveiled two state of the art Assistive Technology Centers during FY08. The Jerry Kainulainen Memorial AT Corner in Sitka and the Alice Rocke Memorial Center in Ketchikan opened their doors to consumers, businesses and the community at large. Now all three of SAIL's main offices offer access to a wide variety of AT so that people and businesses can come see what technology exists, try it out, and determine if any of the tools would be beneficial. SAIL now has the largest and most comprehensive AT lending library in Southeast Alaska.

AT also includes equipment such as wheelchairs, shower benches, ramps, walkers, canes, crutches, commodes, beds, and hand controls, etc. One of SAIL's most widely used services are our loan closets of this type of equipment. During FY08 SAIL loaned 303 items and the Consumer Service Fund provided funding for more than 50 assistive technology purchases, home modifications, and other services to promote independent living.

Collaboration is not just a buzz word...

One of SAIL's greatest strengths has always been uniting organizations and people for the purpose of achieving a common goal - personal independence and equality for all. FY08 was no different. SAIL partnered with more than three dozen agencies on numerous projects throughout Southeast Alaska.

SAIL partners with Alaska Center for the Blind & Visually Impaired

Fortuna O'Dell, a woman from Juneau with macular degeneration, came to SAIL to get skills to adapt to low vision so she could stay independent and active in her home and community. After a referral and travel preparations, Fortuna was off to the Alaska Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired in Anchorage. She learned about the latest assistive technology devices and how to make them work for her. Fortuna received a Sherlock digital identifier, a device that

allows a person to label items verbally. She learned about tactile marking in a kitchen, the grid method for cleaning, how to cook safely on a stove, slicing, chopping, and pouring techniques for low vision, alternative measuring techniques, and fire prevention and control. Fortuna also learned how to use a video eye (videoeye.com), a device that magnifies and sends images of your environment to a TV screen.

Alaska Speaks Up!

SAIL partnered with numerous domestic violence shelters, legal advocates, and local law enforcement personnel throughout Southeast Alaska to teach a curriculum called Alaska Speaks Up! The comprehensive training is designed for vulnerable populations, which includes people with disabilities and seniors, on abuse issues and how to be safe in their communities. "It is really important to get people aware of the abuse issues that people with disabilities face so individuals can become more active in their communities to assist those in need," Jeff Irwin of SAIL said about the trainings. "There is a statistic in the training that states 9 out 10 people with disabilities have at some point or currently are victims of abuse. That statistic is just too high," he stated. The purpose of the training is to increase awareness and education that will lead to safer and more just lives for all people with disabilities and other vulnerable adults such as seniors, and to empower those who are in abusive situations to make positive changes.

RecWorks!, a grant-funded pilot project designed to demonstrate that participation in recreation can build pre-employment and ultimately long-term employability skills, got off the ground this year. The motto of the program is "From Enjoyment to Employment." The RecWorks! Philosophy is that positive recreational opportunities build confidence and myriad skills, thereby enhancing an individual's prospects for employment matches.

Pushing the limits!

In 2008, the ORCA program assisted consumers in pushing their personal limits. Strengths were tested. fears were overcome, and victory was celebrated!

Highlights of the year included a first-ever glacier trek in Juneau, celebrating native culture in Sitka, and snorkeling in the underwater world in Ketchikan. Through these activities, ORCA consumers enhanced a sense of adventure, gained self confidence, and experienced a healthy lifestyle.

New Accessible Taxi on the Road

SAIL replaced Juneau's only accessible taxi which riders will find not only more convenient than the older one, but also more available. The new vehicle has a manual ramp which greatly reduces the amount of time that it takes to load and unload. It also reduces the amount of time that the taxi might be unavailable due to mechanical problems with the lift. In addition, SAIL continued to offer subsidized rides at 40 cents on the dollar, to people with disabilities or individuals 60 and older. This program is designed to supplement public transportation and Para-transit. It often provides the only option to those living outside the city bus area, or those who need rides when Capital Transit or Care-a-Van are not available. **The taxi program** provided over 4800 rides to seniors and people with disabilities during FY08.

Some Successes of Note

With ongoing support from the State Independent Living Council and United Way Southeast, we were able to sustain our rural outreach program this year, reaching consumers in most of Southeast's cities, towns and villages, from Yakutat to Metlakatla.

We increased our city grant revenues by nearly 10%, more than doubling our support in Sitka.

A technology grant from Rasmuson Foundation enabled us to purchase vital software to track donor and volunteer contributions, improve our server and office hardware in Juneau,

and outfit AT demonstration rooms in both Ketchikan and Sitka.

Fundraising events paid off in a big way in FY08, with the reinvention of our annual auction as a mission-based event serving to educate donors to serve SAIL's cause.
