News from Sitka 15 SAIL celebrated its *15 year anniversary* in style with a formal banquet and silent auction on November 9th! Master of Ceremonies Kevin Sullivan guided attendees through the evening's events. Guests shared a delicious meal catered by the Hangar on the Wharf, heard success stories from SAIL board and staff, and had a great time bidding on auction items.

This first-time event was highlighted with our guest from Missoula, Montana. Comedian Michael Beers (*pictured at right*) commanded the audience's attention with his wit and humor. Jokes focused on his disability and how spoken English and American Sign Language can inadvertently describe people with disabilities in bizarre ways. "Disability can be funny," said Beers. "It's just like anything else that makes a person an individual. Aspects of that are funny. You can use humor to relate that to people who don't go through that experience."



Guests enjoyed bidding early and often—even against friends and family—on 100 silent auction items and twenty decadent desserts. The room's energy rose to a new high when three outcry desserts raised over \$400! That enthusiasm fueled the audience's competition for live bidding on a Get-a-Away package for two to Gustavus, a week's time-share anywhere in the world, and a priceless Ultimate Party package including transportation, beer, and a band at DIPAC. Between auction revenues and contributions to the annual campaign, we have raised a grand total of \$25,000 *so far*.



Another unique aspect of this night included having all SAIL staff employees from the Ketchikan and Sitka offices attend. Board members also traveled to Juneau for the event. Speeches from Clark Gruening, SAIL's Board President, & Joan O'Keefe, SAIL's Executive Director, welcomed and thanked the audience. For their long-time involvement with SAIL and ORCA on a multitude of levels, Lee and Christy Hagmeier (*pictured at left*) received an official Certificate of Appreciation & Recognition from SAIL along with kind words from our own Executive Director, Joan O'Keefe. Concluding the night was a heart-warming speech from longtime volunteer and advocate, Sioux Douglas.

Juneau's Taxi Program is Back!

Effective November 1st, the Juneau office reinstated the Discount Taxi Fare Program. We are sorry for the break in availability of this program, but due to the late notification of the grant award we were unable to continue offering the tokens until proper notice was received regarding our grant. However, we are thrilled to be able to offer this program to persons with disabilities and persons over age 60 once again!

The newly enhanced program features taxi vouchers instead of tokens. As always the vouchers are non-transferable and a person must be signed up for the voucher program in order to use the vouchers. Applications must be done in person at the SAIL office. The vouchers will also be tracked this fiscal year with numbering and will expire June 30, 2008.

While the tokens have been available to use during this hiatus, it is now very important that folks use up their old plastic taxi tokens ASAP because plastic tokens won't be usable for taxi rides beginning January 1, 2008. If you won't be able to use the tokens in time, please call our office to make arrangements to exchange them for the new vouchers.

Lastly, as a reminder, always:

- 1) Call us (586-4920) before coming in to buy— we may still sell out before the end of the month
- 2) This taxi voucher program is meant as a SUPPLEMENT to, not a replacement of, the Capital Transit Bus System and Care-A-Van; please only use the taxi vouchers when the existing transportation systems are unavailable because of their hours of operation, service areas, or other factors such as an emergency. (This was heavily impressed upon us at our grant review, and our funding absolutely depends on it.)
